The booking sheets will be available again at the May meeting. However the classes have been opened up to other guilds.


March Meeting - Alice Alva


Research for this report began some days prior to the meeting, using Google to investigate just who is Alice Alva and what does she do. The internet can be either a frustrating or a wonderful thing. In this instance it was the former. There was a lot about Alice but nothing truly insightful. Most web sites showed the same dialogue, almost to the letter what was published in the April newsletter. So with a few brief notes I decided to wait until the meeting, to see if the person, Alice Alva, would reveal more than the internet. I will not delve into her education or exhibit achievements, these are there for all to see on-line.

This is written from a personal point of view not a collective one as I did not ask other members what they thought of the presentation. I do not think anyone there that night was disappointed. Alice gave a verbal and visual presentation. The first thing I noticed was plastic canvas, I had not

seen that particular material for many years. Very practical for the work Alice does, a firm base for larger art works, no stretching frame required, and she has sourced it in colours. Rather envious. Although it would appear she has to use friends travelling to America to bring supplies back, or on a trip she did herself. The freight costs if using post/courier are too prohibitive.

Her worked examples on a table were a visual feast, colour! lots of it used with abandon and without fear. A wide range of materials were used to stitch onto the canvas, wool, vinyl lacing, nylon, metallic, natural threads and only one experiment ever done with acrylic knitting yarn.





So who is Alice Alva and what does she do? Her move into the world of creative arts began as learning to draw, this was replaced by painting due to a non-harmonious relationship with pens, pencils etc. Alice discovered that painting gave her a much more fluid outlet, this then led to her enjoyment of repetitive shapes/patterns, nothing in her art work could be recognised as anything from the everyday visual world. Not true abstract as the art world recognised but definitely Alice Abstract.

Then the thought, where to from here? It seemed a natural progression to adapt paintings to fabric. From fabric to the plastic canvas. Some very unusual examples were layered canvas pieces, each layer with stitching on and one spaced above the other in a frame. Visually these were what intrigued me the most.

One point that Alice was not hesitant in saying about herself, she does not like negative spaces, you know, those bits between a design, they can often look like something

but you can never quite figure out what. And what to do with them? Over time Alice has almost eliminated these irksome negative spaces by placing more patterns on her work and stitching between the actual work designs. This elimination was evident when viewing the time frame art works from oldest to latest. But did she notice all those little spare holes in the plastic canvas?

There was one slide shown with Alice's strengths and weaknesses', Embroiders Neck was on top of her weakness list. At least she was not afraid to admit to this.


