

Using a mixture of metal shims (fine, stitchable metal), metal cloths, papers, velvet or felt, stitch and other emellishments create a textured panel based around beautiful patterns of bark.

We will look at domestic and reclaimed metals as well as craft metal shims, learn colouring and manipulation techniques and how to incorporate these materials into your embroidery. The course will allow both machine and hand stitch possibilities depending on your preference.

This incredible Aubusson* carpet was completed by Barry between 2021-22. The cushions were made this year.

*Aubusson carpet, floor covering, usually of considerable size, handwoven at the villages of Aubusson and Felletin, in the département of Creuse in central France. Workshops were established in 1743 to manufacture pile carpets primarily for the nobility, to whom the Savonnerie court production was not available. Aubusson carpets were, however, also made for the royal residences. Soon after the production of carpets began at Aubusson, the pileless tapestry technique previously in use in this district was adopted for so many of the carpets that the word Aubusson has become synonymous with a flat-woven French carpet, and it is not generally realized that piled rugs in numbers have been made there.

Many of the early Aubussons were made in modified Oriental designs, some

resembling Ushak medallion carpets. Taste soon changed to a range of Renaissance floral and architectural patterns similar to those in use at the Savonnerie and continued to reflect court and republican fashions up to the modernistic painterly concepts of the 20th century.










Speaker for April Meeting



We are so lucky to have Leimomi Oakes coming to speak to us this month. She does such beautiful work and is multi talented. Leimomi Oakes is a Hawaiian born but Wellington based, fashion and textile historian who specialises in recreating historical fashions using period accurate techniques, and in exploring the way historical events and societal mores influenced, and were influenced by, fashion and textiles.

Leimomi is a Senior Tutor in Costume Construction at Toi Whakaari, the New Zealand Drama School. She also has a sewing pattern line, Scroop Patterns, which offers modern and historical patterns. She has previously worked at Te Papa and taught in the College of Creative Arts at Massey University. She has been featured in Threads magazine and on numerous international fashion and sewing blogs and websites. She also authors the popular fashion & textile history blog https://thedreamstress.com

Updated Regional Name Change

At the 2020 Mana Guild AGM, a member proposed from the floor that the regional name be changed from Cook Strait to a name reflecting the region's original heritage. Since Marlborough and Nelson Guilds left the region, Cook Strait was no longer an appropriate name, and her proposal was that the region be renamed Raukawa.

A paper prepared by Mana Guild was circulated around the other regional Guilds, and this suggestion was discussed in a regional breakout session at the 2022 Biennial Conference. While there was general support for the concept of a Maori name, there was no consensus over Raukawa as the name. Since then, other guilds have suggested Tararua, and there has been general support for that. Mana has withdrawn its original proposal of Raukawa, and supports renaming the region Tararua. Susan Lennie, our regional representative, has discussed the process with the ANZEG National President and has been advised that once a decision has been reached by the region it can simply be ratified by the National Executive as it does not require a change to the ANZEG Rules.

Mana Guild now submits this paper, and the attached background information on the appropriateness of the name Tararua for the region (prepared by Aneta Wi Neera of Mana Guild).

The following motion will be proposed at the next meeting - "That the ANZEG Cook Strait Region be renamed Tararua Region."

All other guilds in the region have supported the motion.

Paemaunga - Tararua Range (Historical Background)


The Tararua Range forms part of the North Island's backbone. It consists of parallel ranges interspersed with deep river valleys, and covers 3,168 square kilometres from the Manawatū Gorge to the Remutaka Range, 100 kilometres to the south.

The metaphorical union between people and the land, Papatūānuku, is seen in places named after parts of the human body. The Tararua Range was declared to be Te Tuarātapu-o-Te Rangihaeata (the sacred back of Te Rangihaeata) to commemorate a peace arrangement between Ngāti Toa and Ngāti Kahungunu. The range became a dividing line between Ngāti Toa on the west side and Ngāti Kahungunu on the east. This view looks along the ridge between Aokaparangi and Mt Hector.



By way of introduction, particularly in Maori circles, a pepeha is used, always commencing with a person's maunga (mountain). For those associated with Tararua Paemanunga, northern hapū of Ngāti Raukawa and Maūpoko on the western side and Ngāti Kahungunu ki Wairarapa on the eastern side the most common is 'Ko Tararua Paemaunga'.

It is not unusual for places to be renamed by Māori and others. Tararua Paemaunga were first named Tararua Paemaunga many centuries ago by Whatonga after his two wives. The subsequent naming in more recent times by Ngāti Toa Rangatira and Ngāti Kahungunu ki Wairarapa of Te Tuarātapu-o-Te Rangihaeata (the sacred back of Te Rangihaeata) is not normally used in pepeha. Te Rangihaeata was strongly associated with Tararua Paemaunga where he died of measles in 1855. It is interesting that Tararua Paemaunga are not the maunga of Ngāti Toa Rangatira (Whitireia is) but they whakapapa closely to their relations further north of their Porirua location.

So there is a geographical link in the description of the Tararua Range being described as 'part of the North Island's backbone' and that conferred metaphorically by two iwi. They then become the Remutaka Range which Wairarapa guild members must cross to visit those on the western side of Tararua Paemaunga and vice versa.
