MARCH MEETING



We have so many talented artisans in the Wellington Region and we are delighted that Christine Brimer can take time out of her busy schedule to talk to us at the next meeting. Christine is well known for beautiful woven cushions, throws and lampshades and she will share with us the how and why she works the way she does. She regards weaving and stitch as cousins and will demonstrate how some loom set ups emulate stitch. Her website is a delight, and I would encourage you to check it out, especially if you are looking for a special gift.



"I weave with undyed natural fibres, exploring surface and form to articulate themes of belonging and our connection to the natural world. By interrogating materials, tools and process I experiment to take loom woven cloth into new territories beyond the rectilinear plane."

Christine is also a passionate supporter of the Wellington City Mission and on the next page you will find two fabulous treats that will help fund their new building project, Whakaramu, which translated means to shelter, safeguard and protect

Christine will be bringing 7 x 15g undyed cream lace weight Corriedale wool thrum bundles (end of loom warps), in approximately 1m lengths (estimate total 125m) for a \$5 donation. The monies will then be donated to the Wellington City Mission building project. This project will see 35 accommodation units with residents and the wider community having access to a range of services including a social supermarket, a commercial laundry facility, a suite of toilets and showers, a medical facility, a chapel and a large public café that will seat 120 people.





Christine will also be promoting a run of 13 bread wraps (a Bakers Dozen) that will be available in May as a fundraiser for Wellington City Mission.

She will put aside a bread wrap for the first 13 people who email her, and after confirmation of a donation of \$50 minimum direct to the Mission, she will deliver or post free of charge (NZ addresses only). What a generous person Christine is. Let's try and support her efforts and those of the Wellington City Mission! More on that at the meeting and in the next newsletter.


Diana Parkes Award

Anne Scott, Minerva has kindly donated a \$100 voucher for our prize

Now is the time to get started on your entry for the Diana Parkes Award, given to the work that best displays the attributes of Diana herself. She believed that telling a story was paramount. Show us your creativity and mixed media work. The award will be given at the WEG workday in March 2024. The criteria for the Award are as follows:

- An original work, completed in the last two years by a member of a Tararua Guild.
- There is no size limitation, can be 3D, can be a banner or clothing and can be a joint project.
- Each entry should be accompanied by a short statement describing the inspiration and/or the technique used (not more than 50 words).
- The work may have been exhibited previously.

Diana Parkes, MNZM joined the Wellington Embroiderers' Guild in 1972 and was a committed member until her untimely death in 2011. Diana's work was exhibited widely in New Zealand and overseas and she won many awards. Her work was shown in WOW in 2006, 2007 and 2009. Her work remains very inspirational, and you can still refer to and be inspired by her blog, which remains online.



Stop Press:

• **Boro** – **timeworn textiles of Japan** showcases a significant collection of Japanese garments beautifully preserved using *boro* stitching and mending techniques. Gathered by artist, Pip Steel, the garments on display have passed through generations of Japanese hands. *Boro* pieces were once cherished, preserved or recycled at a time in history when textiles were precious commodities. Despite limited means, Japanese rural women created captivating works of art with their stitches and make-do repairs. If you love anything to do with textiles, sustainable fashion, or stitching techniques, this is the exhibition for you.

Obituary Betty Logan

Andrea, Betty's daughter has let us know that Betty passed away peacefully on Valentines Day 14 February 2024. She was 102 years of age. The family are having a memorial afternoon tea on the 9th of March at the Community Centre, Midlands Gardens, Milne Drive, Paraparaumu from 1.30pm - 3.30pm.

Betty Logan was a very early member of the Wellington Guild and a member of the National Museum of New Zealand Textile Conservation Group. In 1976 the Koru group, an association of twelve exhibiting embroiderers, was formed in Wellington with the help of Betty, a respected embroidery tutor. The group expanded, and exhibited on 21 different occasions throughout the 1980s, presenting innovative embroideries on varied themes.

She was appointed the Guild "Keeper of the Textiles" in 1983, and established a programme of cataloguing, storage, washing and display. Each month Betty selected a piece from the Guild Historic Collection to display at the guild meeting and gave a talk on the subject. When the Wellington Embroiderers' Guild was required to move from Turnbull House where the collection was housed, it was gifted to Te Papa. Betty was made a Life Member in 1991. She was an innovative embroiderer and was generous in her work, sharing her knowledge with others both personally, and as a highly regarded tutor, including teaching classes at Wellington High School.

She is pictured here at the Guild's 50th Anniversary Exhibition opening in 2016 with her Manaia panel worked in 1980. Betty was a valued Life Member of the Wellington Embroiderers' Guild, which was in recognition of her great lifelong contribution to embroidery in Wellington
